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Facilitators and barriers to integrated employment: Results of focus group analysis

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Abstract. The current study examined narrative data from a series of semi-structured focus groups in order to identify and examine the proficiencies and deficiencies in practice competencies specific to job functions in the changing practice environment of vocational rehabilitation (VR). Focus groups were conducted with members of organizations, individual service providers, as well as consumers and their families, and data were gathered to determine the potential barriers to employment and service needs of individuals with the most significant disabilities living in Wisconsin. Three major domains identified by the comprehensive needs assessment are employment knowledge, systems interactions and navigation, and consumer needs. Recommendations are aimed at increasing opportunities for community-based employment for persons with disabilities, increasing communication between consumers and service providers, and most importantly, eliminating financial disincentives that promote facility based employment.

1. Introduction

Drastic changes in system infrastructure has drastically altered the practice of vocational rehabilitation (VR), and changes in rehabilitation practice settings have led to evolving job functions and professional roles for rehabilitation practitioners and introduced new challenges in the provision of integrated employment opportunities for individuals with the most severe disabilities [1, 2].

Several role and function studies have delineated specific roles and competencies that are associated with optimal service provision of rehabilitation counseling [1] and job placement services [2]. However, the role and function studies do not incorporate the nuances of

the managed care and long-term care systems, nor do they account for variation in availability of employment services for persons with disabilities.

The current study asks the following research questions, (1) what service-delivery factors enhance vocational outcomes for persons with disabilities, and (2) what service-delivery factors limit opportunities for integrated employment? An in-depth qualitative analysis was conducted to examine facilitators and barriers to integrated employment, as identified by stakeholders at each level of the VR process serving consumers living in Wisconsin. The findings of thematic analysis are presented in descriptive terms. Limitations and generalizability of findings are discussed, and recommendations for clinical practice are proposed.
